**OLD BUSINESS**

**NEW BUSINESS**

Ralph provided an update of the status of HB 1006 and the discussions that had occurred in the Senate Appropriations Committee. He was in attendance at that hearing. The committee also reviewed the changes that had been made in the 2<sup>nd</sup> reading before the Senate. There were a number of amendments made to the legislation and it appeared that they addressed the primary concerns that the Association had with the legislation.

Ralph provided an update as to the discussions that were occurring with regards to the fiscal impact of HB 1006 on the local criminal justice systems. He had been asked to participate in a group that was being facilitated by Senator Tallian. The group was discussing the fiscal impact of HB 1006 upon several local criminal justice stakeholder groups and hoped to present a funding proposal to the legislative leaders.

There was much discussion as to the future direction of this committee and recommendations that they would make to the Association's Executive Committee. A great deal was learned during this session and several areas were identified in which the Association and the committee could improve their efforts. Ralph is going to put together a list of suggestions and present them to Bill Watson, President of IACCAC.

The committee spent the remainder of the meeting watching the Senate, via the web, holds it 3<sup>rd</sup> reading on HB 1006. It passed and will be sent to conference committee to resolve the differences.

The committee did not schedule a future meeting date, as they will have discussions during the IACCAC Summer Business meeting and plan for additional meeting over the summer.
